Some History: The Doctrine of

Discovery is a principle of international law dating from the late 15th century. It has roots in a papal decree issued by Pope Nicholas V in 1452 that specifically sanctioned and promoted the conquest, colonization, and exploitation of non-Christian territories and peoples. Hundreds of years of decisions and laws continuing into our own time can ultimately be traced back to the Doctrine of Discovery—laws that invalidate or ignore the rights, sovereignty, and humanity of indigenous people in the United States and around the world. These theological underpinnings led to the genocide of the indigenous people in New England and beyond. In the years following the European invasion of the Americas, smallpox and other deadly germs killed an estimated 90% of the Native Americans, who had no immunity from any of these deadly viruses. All the land in what we call the United States was land occupied by Indigenous native peoples.

In 2012, the Unitarian Universalist Association (UUA) passed a Resolution to repudiate and dismantle the Doctrine of Discovery. The Resolution called upon the United States to fully implement the standards of the U.N. Declaration on the Rights of Indigenous Peoples, without qualifications, in U.S. law and policy. The

November 29: Worthy Now -**Reverend Jennifer Johnson**

President's Message: November Is Native American Heritage Month

UUA was one of six Faith Communities and Denominations to do so.

Today the Wampanoag Tribe of Gay Head is the only federally recognized tribe in MA. There are an additional five tribes in the state. In the beginning of the 17th century, at the time of first contact with the European colonists, more than 3,000 Wampanoag lived on Martha's Vineyard. From 1615-1619, the smallpox virus and/or leptospirosis, a bacterial infection, caused high fatality rates and decimated the Wampanoag population. Today, the Wampanoag Tribe owns 485 acres at the southwestern part of Martha's Vineyard and number 901 members. 300 of whom live on Martha's Vineyard.

Early European settlers brought systems of government that bore little resemblance to tribal practices and values, missionaries intent on converting the tribal members to Christianity, and private models of land use and ownership that conflicted with the tribes' own communal practices and values. Communal practices and values are part of the covenantal relationships in UU congregations. Our Unitarian Universalist covenantal practice is rooted in mutual commitment, mutual trust, and concern for the welfare of one another.

Advocacy Today: The National Congress of American Indians and many tribes have issued a call for all Native American sport team mascots, logos, and nicknames in MA

public schools to be removed. The key bills of Prohibiting Native Mascots in MA and Changing the MA Flag and Seal were voted favorably out of committee last February. The MA Indigenous Legislative Agenda supports removing the white supremacist state flag and seal of MA, which features a white hand holding a Colonial broadsword over the head of a Native American; this has been voted out of committee. The bill to Protect Native American Heritage also successfully moved out of committee. For more information about how you can be involved, go to UUMassAction.com and click on First Nation's Rights. National Day of Mourning: November 26th at 12 pm, Cole's Hill in Plymouth

Since 1970, Native Americans and their supporters have gathered at noon on Cole's Hill in Plymouth to commemorate a National Day of Mourning on the U.S. Thanksgiving holiday. Thanksgiving Day is a reminder of the genocide of millions of Native people, the theft of Native lands, and the relentless assault on Native culture. This is a day of remembrance and spiritual connection as well as a protest against the racism and oppression that Native Americans continue to experience. 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November is Native American Heritage Month. It is a time to celebrate rich and diverse cultures, traditions, and histories and to acknowledge the important contributions of Native and indigenous people. This month is also an opportune time to educate the general public about tribes, to raise a general awareness about the unique challenges Native and indigenous people have faced both historically and in the present, and the ways in which tribal citizens have worked to conquer these challenges. The Wampanoag Tribe gained federal recognition in

2007. In 2018,

the federal government took action to rescind recognition. U.S. District Judge Paul Friedman in Washington, DC, granted a summary judgment on behalf of the Mashpee Wampanoag Tribe on Friday, concluding the Interior Department's actions were "arbitrary, capricious, an abuse of discretion, and contrary to law." Many in our congregation wrote to support the Mashpee Tribe.
