October 4: Putting the Sacred Back in Sacrifice - Reverend Jennifer Johnson

She is a graduate of Meadville Lombard Theological School and currently serves as Learning Fellow for Prison Ministry at Church of the Larger Fellowship. October 18: What Is Ours to Do? - David LaMotte



In a world full of large, complex, and overwhelming problems, it is sometimes hard to imagine that we can have much impact. Many of us long for a better world, but are rendered immobile by the enormity of things, and the endless list of issues that demand our attention. How do we determine what is ours to do — and what isn't?

David LaMotte is a singer/ songwriter with a 3000-concert career, and the author of three books, including White Flour and Worldchanging 101: Challengng the Myth of Powerlessness. He is the co-founder of PEG Partners, a non-profit that supports literacy, critical thought, and artistic expression in Guatemalan schools, and the creator of LetsBeNeighbors.org. He holds a master's degree in Peace Studies from Brisbane, Australia's University of Queensland, which he obtained as a Rotary Peace Fellow, and is the former Clerk of the AFSC Nobel Peace Prize Nominating Committee. He lives in Black Mountain, North Carolina, with his wife and son.

President's Message: What UUSMV Means to Me

I moved to MV in 2001, when Janice and I bought the little bakery in Oak Bluffs, with retail sites in Edgartown and Vineyard Haven. The move was difficult; at age 50, I had to get a new doctor, hearing specialist, barber, dentist, you name it! And I needed a new veterinarian, which was the most difficult decision. I decided that fall I wanted to make some new friends and was driving up upper Main St. in Vineyard Haven when a little church caught my eye; specifically, the rainbow flag caught my attention. I thought this may be a place I can meet some liberal-minded people, so I ventured in one Sunday. I found myself on the Parish Committee in 2003 and spent several years serving as a Trustee, which was my first love. Our "building" is fascinating, and I love how it felt to be in the Sanctuary. The church and the members were warm and inviting and went out of their way to introduce themselves and be friendly. It seemed that this was exactly what I was looking for so that I could find a sense of community here on Martha's Vineyard. I was prepared to jump into whatever needed doing that I had the talent and time for. I had not experienced Unitarian Universalism before; I grew up a Methodist and was turned off to traditional religion because, as a gay person, I was not welcome in many churches. Unitarian Universalist values of the 7 Principles fit my world view. I had reached a point in my life when I had decided I would only join something that touched my heart and soul, and I would only spend time with people who were likeminded. It is really an honor to serve our faith community. I want to spend the time I am given to make a difference in the corner of the world I find myself in

UUSMV has a heart as big as the Island. We are people who will stop what we are doing to make and deliver a meal to one of us in need; we will offer to drive one another to an appointment; we send cards for accomplishments, birthdays, or for no reason but to stay in touch; we pick up the phone and chat with someone who needs a listening ear; we are there for one another when one of us is ill or when we lose a loved one. We are generous with our time, our talents, and our treasure so that our small, but mighty church has the financial ability to continue to serve and to inspire us to be better people and to create a better world. UUs are generous in spirit. "Our highest calling is to BE the church, not to go to church." We invite you to show your gratitude for our UUSMV community with a generous pledge in the upcoming pledge campaign. Pledge according to your means; we are grateful for your participation as we strive to have 100% participation from our memhars

We are in a time of change and transition. As we begin to look toward 2021, we will work on articulating our individual and collective vision for our future. Will we hire a minister? When? It will be too cold to sit on the porches and socially distant visit. How will we stay connected with one another? All ideas welcome! I close by acknowledging the stress many feel with the untimely death of the icon for civil rights, women's rights, and voting rights, Ruth Bader Ginsberg, and the upcoming election. Reach out. Treasurer's Report

Thanks to your payment of pledges and your offerings, UUSMV is financially stable. We can sustain our church, care for our Chapel, and look toward the future. We are spending a bit more in some categories (guest speakers and Lori's salary) and less in other areas (printing, utilities, physical care of the Chapel). Financials Statements are posted in the Members section of our webpage.

If there is any excess income at the end of the year, it will be transferred to Reserve Funds. Reserve Funds are

used to pay for operating losses, emergency repairs, and future projects.

As noted in the box at the left, I am handling the Minister's Discretionary Fund during the absence of a minister. If there is anyone in need of a helping hand, please let me know.

The pledge drive has begun – we hope all of you will make a pledge for 2021. The Finance Committee will begin work on the budget for 2021, and knowing the amount of income we can expect will be a critical piece of the budgeting process.

The threat of COVID, and uncertainty about when a safe, effective vaccine will readily be available to the public, is making it difficult to plan for

Let's Work to Eliminate Our Reliance on Fundraising



Our pledges currently cover only 72% of our operating expenses. Other sources of income include:

Interest and dividends (9%)

- Offerings and gifts (9%)
- Fundraising (6%)
- Building rentals (4%)

Fundraising is labor intensive and unpredictable, and we're all too aware that any time we do fundraising we're asking our members to create or donate fundraising items and then purchase them! A first step to building a more sustainable income is to eliminate the use of fundraising to cover operating expenses. This year we are asking you to think about what you typically spend on our fundraising

events and add that to your pledge. Our 2021 goal is to eliminate reliance on fundraising for our operating expenses. Any fundraising that we might choose to do could go toward special projects, our building fund, or universal justice projects, i.e. not for electricity, staff salaries, or other operating expenses. And just think, our potlucks could be solely for social, community building. not fundraising!

Join the UUSMV Crop Walk Team



when it truly adds to the discourse.

Be Prepared to Not Know the Election Results



With the expected increase in mail voting, we may not know the results of the Presidential election on November 3rd. We may not know the results for days. Delayed results sometimes happen in tight State races with mail in voting, but it has not happened in a presidential election since 2000.

This is especially worrisome this year, because the current president has suggested that voting by mail will lead to fraud and he can only lose if the election is rigged. However, as reported by the Washington Post, a recent analysis of voting in 2016 and 2018 in states with mail voting cast

the risk of fraud at 0.0025%. ("Minuscule number of potentially fraudulent ballots in states with universal mail voting undercuts Trump claims about election risks" by Elise Viebeck, *The Washington Post*, June 8, 2020.)

The delay will not be due to fraud but due to the time it takes to count the mailed ballots. State election officials are mixed on how long it will take to count ballots. States who have been using mail voting for years do not expect significant delays. States who expanded mail in voting this year due to the pandemic and the difficul-

ties faced by the US Postal Service suggest it may be days before all votes are counted. Many states do not allow ballots to be counted until election day. (https://www.ncsl.org/research/elections-and-campaigns/vopp-table-16-when-absentee-mail-ballot-processing-and-counting-can-begin.aspx)

So, another way to protect the results of the election is to prepare to be patient and share this information with those who may be suspect about mail voting.
