# President's Message

Covenanting is at the heart of the practice of Unitarian Universalism. Our religious ancestors created our tradition as a faith community bound not by allegiance to a particular creed—specific beliefs—but rather by faithfulness to a covenant—a set of mutual promises to each other and to something greater than ourselves. Spiritual leadership calls us to remember that covenant is a practice, not a product. We invited Dorie Godfrey to facilitate our work to develop a covenant for our 2021 Parish Committee. We are deeply appreciative of Dorie's guidance and support!

Understanding different personality and communication styles and how they manifest in our meetings and group settings is important to our success. We will use one of these tools: "16 Personalities" or "Truity" (free and available

online). We will be respectful of not only what we discuss, but the process of the discussion. We will send information to members ahead of the meeting to give time to everyone to think about a proposal or discussion topic. If there is no clear consensus on a topic, and whenever possible, we will postpone action to the next meeting, so everyone has time to think about the discussion before taking action. We will strive to find the balance between a process, where everyone talks through pros and cons of a topic, and a product, when to close discussion/debate and take action.

We share our covenant with you, our members and friends, who entrust us to faithfully carry out the governance work of our Society.

As members of the Parish Committee, we covenant and

affirm that we will...

- Provide a safe environment where we each can speak our truth with kindness,
- Build trust where we understand and honor each other's strengths and vulnerabilities,
- Practice honesty, openness, transparency, and integrity,
- Listen attentively and respect and value our differences,
- Engage in a productive, constructive manner if conflict arises,
- Presume good faith and practice reconciliation and forgiveness,
- Be willing to learn about and understand cultural shifts and be open to changes in thinking.

# Notes from the PC



Lucinda Sheldon, Kristy Brooks, Karen Sankey, Jan Casey, Rita Brown and Celeste Stickney Missing: Glenn Palmer Your Parish Committee met via Zoom last month on March 10th. Here are some highlights.

After a bit of editing, Parish

Committee members unanimously approved their Covenant with one another.

- We acknowledged Dorie Godfrey and her suggestion and coordination of Island churches ringing their bells 50 times in recognition of the 500,000 deaths due to COVID-19.
- pledges already being paid, on a year-to-date basis we have excess income of \$32,000. The Finance Committee will be meeting soon to discuss an investment strategy for some of our cash holdings in order

- to make a recommendation to the Parish Committee.
- We approved a \$500 donation to the UUA Disaster Relief Fund for those affected by the recent storms in Texas.
- The Trustees continue to work to prioritize the maintenance needs of the Chapel.
- A big Thank You to the 34 members who participated in the Vision 2025 session! A committee has been formed and will be working on writing our Vision 2025 statement. Stay tuned for details.
  - Coming out of the Visioning session, there was a lot of feedback regarding the use of the back parcel, and a Backyard Planning Team has assembled to assess our options.

- It is clear that people want Zoom to continue to be an option for services even when we can be back in the Chapel. To that end, the PC is beginning to explore ways to make that possible.
- Three members have volunteered to be on the Minister Search Team.
   Our By Laws state that the congregation must approve the committee members and that meeting/vote will be held sometime in May.

The next PC meeting: Wednesday, April 14th, 4:00-6:00 pm. If you plan to attend and/or have an agenda item to suggest, please contact Rita Brown.

"Arab" is a cultural and Muslims but there are also millions of Christian Arabs and thousands of Jewish Arabs, just as there are Muslim, Christian, and Jewish Americans. Who are Arab Americans? Arab Americans are Americans of Arab descent. There are Americans with roots in each Arab country, but most originate from Lebanon, Syria, and Palestine. There are also substantial com-

munities from Egypt, Yemen, and Iraq. The first immigrants arrived in the late 19th century. A second wave of immigration started after World War II, and still continues. The largest communities live in the Detroit area.



### How Many Arab Countries Could You Name?

The Arab World consists of 22 countries in the Middle East and North Africa: Algeria, Bahrain, the Comoros Islands, Djibouti, Egypt, Iraq, Jordan, Kuwait, Libya, Morocco, Mauritania, Oman, Palestine, Qatar, Saudi Arabia, Somalia, Sudan, Syria, Tunisia, the **United Arab** Emirates, and Yemen. The Comoros Islands, not pictured on this map, are off the coast of Mozambique.



# Sharing the Food Culture of Syria

We are not exposed much to Arab Americans – and as with any other disconnect, misunderstandings and misconceptions, often based on stereotypes, can arise. This offers us a good opportunity to question the sort of assumptions that tend to form, usually unconsciously, in the absence of experience, and intentionally replace them with reality, facts, and personal connections. This is not always easy when the news is troubling and hard to hear.

One way that I have found to overcome my natural reluctance to think about depressing situa-

tions like, for example, the plight of refugees or farm women caught in war zones, is to make contact with the strength and culture of such people through appreciation of their music, poetry, crafts, and especially recipes. Cooking people's food, like cooking food for people, creates a positive bond that can lead to real attention, genuine concern, and opportunities to improve difficult situations. The book Soup for Syria is a compilation of soup recipes from famous chefs to benefit people in refugee camps in Lebanon. Buy it, get it from the library, or borrow it from me if you are interested. The recipes come from all over the world here is one from Paula Wolfert. who summered on the Vineyard and wrote some of her

cookbooks here. —Rebecca Gilbert

#### **Lentil and Swiss Chard Soup** Serves 4-5

- I cup (200 g) brown lentils I onion, chopped
- 2 tablespoons extra virgin olive
- 2 small garlic cloves, crushed 2 lb. (1 kg) Swiss chard leaves, finely shredded
- $\frac{1}{2}$  cup (20 g) chopped cilantro Salt, to taste

Freshly ground black pepper Pinch cayenne pepper Simmer lentils in 6 cups water till almost done, sweat the onions in oil, combine all ingredients except lemon juice and simmer 15 more minutes, stir in lemon juice. Serve hot, cold, or room temperature.


