More than a century ago the philosopher William James spoke words that are more true today than when he first uttered them. He said: "We live in a world that is uncertain of being saved." And then he asked: "Are you willing to participate in such a world?" How can we be spiritually whole while remaining faithful to a world that is both beautiful and broken?

Rev. Rob Hardies is our part-time minister for 2021.



He is a preacher, teacher and an experienced leader of retreats and pilgrimages. From 2001 to 2020, he was Senior Minister of All Souls Church, Unitarian in Washington, DC, a large, dynamic multiracial congregation. During his ministry at All Souls, Rob helped create organizations that advocated for marriage equality and for voting rights. He lives in Washington with his husband and son.

Nov 28: *Holding History: An Anti-Racist Explora- tion of Rest* - Beyssa Buil

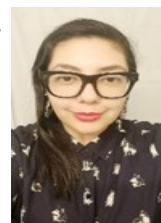

Dear Friends,
Earlier this week a friend and I took a long walk in the foothills of the Appalachian Mountains. It was a beautiful autumn day, and the sun's golden light cut sharp angles through stands of Red Oak and Eastern Hemlock. Emerging from the forest, we found ourselves on a high craggy peak from which we looked out over a valley carpeted in autumn colors: green, gold, orange and red.

Fall always gets me thinking about the transience of things; the Earth's changing seasons recalling the cycles of own lives. Maybe that's why

we celebrate holidays such as All Souls Day and Día de los Muertos in the fall. These sacred days remind us of the impermanence of our lives even as they bear witness to the persistence of our love for one another beyond the grave.

If I must die!

UUSMV plans a robust return to in-person services by early spring and the financial support by all of us is needed for our success!

At the Parish Committee's October meeting, Rev. Rob encouraged us to do a few things well, since we lack the person power to do everything we would like to do. We will be guided by our Mission and Vision and our Unitarian Universalist faith principles and values. After much discussion, we identified our priorities as worship and music, caring and community building, a focused Universal Justice program, and the Ministerial Search to find a half-time long-term minister who can live

among us and guide us to be a faithful liberal voice on Martha's Vineyard and beyond. To accomplish these priorities, we will plan bite size opportunities for many members' participation as we, together, build our capacity for our beloved community.

We have a deep yearning to gather in person again. Our first concern remains the safeguarding of the well-being of our members, friends, and the public, in alignment with our UU values. The worship committee, with Rev. Rob Hardies, is planning a robust and celebratory return to in person gatherings in the early spring. We may return (with a reduced capacity) to Stevens

Chapel, and we may have services and gatherings in our outdoor church spiritual place (aka the back yard!).

By the first week in March, our new hybrid audio visual equipment will be installed. There will be quality on-line Zoom Sunday worship at the same time some will gather in person. Regardless of how the future unfolds, UUSMV will rise to the challenge to keep all our members gathered in person or virtually! We plan to publicize our gatherings to the island community when we roll out our spring worship services, with great in person music!

Your Parish Committee met via Zoom last month on October 20th. Here are some highlights.

- Please remember to contact Ann in the office with any address changes so we can keep our online directory current.
- We welcomed Jim Thomas as a guest. Jim has agreed to be a candidate for a leadership position for the 2022/23 year.
- Rev. Rob shared some of his initial observations from meetings with church leaders and members during his time on island in September, including the following:

- ◇ The strength of the congregation and leadership – this bodes well for UUSMV's future!
- ◇ Volunteer fatigue.
- ◇ A desire/need for education around UU history/identity/values.
- ◇ Creating a sacred space in our back yard.

How we might focus our efforts during our year with Rob in four main areas so that we can be successful in doing the right things:

- ◇ Worship (including music)
- ◇ Caring/Community Building
- ◇ Social Justice in the world
- ◇ Ministerial Search
- Our year-to-date budgeted income exceeds expenses by \$58K. The Finance Committee will begin working on the 2022 budget shortly and will discuss at a Town

Hall Meeting to be held after service on November 21st.

- 30 pledges have been received totaling \$58,300. It's not too late to make your pledge!
- We will be signing a contract with Power Sound New England for an audio/visual package to be installed the week of March 7th, 2022. Revisions to the initial estimate brought the cost down to \$20,317.
- Be on the lookout for exciting information about our Candlelight services!

UUSMV's Archives to Move to MV Museum

When we cleaned out the small attic over the chapel office in 2007, we sent a lot of items left over from yard sales to the dump. But we found some priceless boxes of the Society's archives which I kept and used to write the not-quite finished history of UU's on Martha's Vineyard.

When the Museum was in Edgartown, there was no room to store additional items. When the Museum moved to the old Marine Hospital in Vineyard Haven, I phoned to see if they

could be accepted, but others had gotten in line ahead of me and there was a backup of items that needed to be archived. I had previously copied them into notebooks for future ready reference on our Society's library shelves, but have not yet presented them as I still hope soon to finish the history.

But now, Bonnie Stacy, the Museum Archivist, is able to accept them and they will be moved to the Museum the first week in November.

When archived, they will be available online. They will be safe, in good condition and readily available online for future historians.

Climate Justice - Food Waste

Does your food waste end up in your garbage? Did you know that food takes up the majority of space in landfills? In the US, we throw away nearly 80 billion pounds of food – about 219 pounds per person – every year?

The IGI (Island Grown Initiative) can help each of us turn our food waste into a valuable commodity! IGI has a 45-foot in-vessel composter

which can transform food waste into nutrient rich compost three times faster than your average home compost pile. IGI processes some 360 tons of food waste each year. The IGI container is available for disposing of food waste from your home compost container.

If you have a kitchen food waste container, you can take it to the IGI Farm on



Stoney Hill Road off the Edgartown-Vineyard Haven Road – turn at the Llama Farm. You can also check with your town “dump”. If you would like to contribute your food waste, but you need a compost container, contact Katharine Colon or Barb Caseau. Katharine Colon for the UUSMV Climate Justice Team

Indigenous Allegiance to Gratitude

Sacred Ground

Many of us who took the Sacred Ground course

describe it as an “eye

opener”. One reason is the readings of the course, but more important, is the world of books on the subject matter that the course opened up for us. One is “Braiding Sweetgrass: Indigenous Wisdom, Scientific Knowledge, and the Teachings of Plants” by Robin Wall Kimmerer.

We are concentrating on one chapter, “Allegiance to Gratitude” in which the author writes about the “Thanksgiving Address” or, in the Onondaga language, “Words That Come Before All Else”. It isn’t an address specifically for Thanksgiving Day, but more like our UU practice of starting a service with a chalice lighting and mes-

sage or a meeting with a covenant.

The author’s daughter had been brought up by her mother’s ritual “carried out on the hill above her house.” The author wrote, “The sunrise ceremony is our Potawatomi way of sending gratitude into the world, to recognize all that we are given and to offer our choicest thanks in return. Many Native peoples across the world, despite myriad cultural differences, have this in common – we are rooted in cultures of gratitude.” No wonder then that the daughter decided to sit out the Pledge of Allegiance at her school. Among other things, as a native American, she questioned the premise of “liberty and justice for all”.

At the Onondaga Nation School, the week begins and ends with the Thanksgiving Address. “All the classes stand together in the atrium, and one

grade each week has responsibility for the oratory.” The members of that class start by saying, “Today we have gathered and when we look upon the faces around us, we see that the cycles of life continue. We have been given the duty to live in balance and harmony with each other and all living things. So now let us bring our minds together as one as we give greetings and thanks to each other as People. Now our minds are one.” Next, they address The Earth Mother, The Waters, The Fish, The Plants, etc. Each element is addressed in a paragraph that ends with “Now our minds are one.” The author reports that “As one clan mother said, ‘It reminds you every day that you have enough. Everything needed to sustain life is already here.’ (continued on page 9)

Family to Family Thanksgiving Supper - UUSMV Team Canceled, but You Can Still Give!

In past years, UUSMV has been a major sponsor of the Family to Family Thanksgiving Supper program, put on by the Vineyard Committee On Hunger (VCOH). Through our donations, we have been responsible for about 25% of the total amount needed. Last year, however, was a disappointment in light of the difficult logistics in reaching out to and engaging the congregation. This of course was due to COVID disruptions and having to meet by ZOOM. Only a portion of the congregation was

in attendance on any given Sunday...and of course there's no practical way to collect and bundle "virtual" checks.

Now, in 2021, we would face the same logistical problems were we to attempt to raise a meaningful contribution to the Thanksgiving supper program. Thus, we have decided to cancel our participation this year. We'll be back next Thanksgiving, more committed than ever. We are assured by VCOH that this year's family suppers will go forward, on a reduced

basis and utilizing reserve funds they have.

MV Museum Highlights Beulah Ocooch Salisbury Vanderhoop



Each week through the conclusion of Indigenous Peoples' Month at the end of November, the Martha's Vineyard Museum highlights a member of the Wampanoag Tribe from the Island's history. This week, Beulah Ocooch Salisbury Vanderhoop's story was shared.

Beulah Ocooch Salisbury Vanderhoop was the wife of William Adrian Vanderhoop, the first Vanderhoop to settle on Noepe. Beulah is known for helping escaped

slaves who had fled the south during the mid 1800s. According to the Museum piece, "Members of the Wampanoag tribe, and most likely others on the Island who were sympathetic to the causes of freedom and escape from persecution, provided assistance, as Beulah Vanderhoop did, hiding escaped slaves under a false floor in the family's barn until transportation was arranged for the next steps in their flight to freedom."

The National Underground Railroad Network to Freedom added the Martha's Vineyard African American Heritage Trail site "Randall Burton" on West Basin Road in 2002 honoring the efforts of Beulah Vanderhoop in the 1854 escape of the escaped slave.

When we do this every day, it leads to an outlook of contentment and respect for all of Creation.”

The author writes, “For me, the cumulative impact of the Pledge of Allegiance... was the cultivation of cynicism and a sense of the nation’s hypocrisy – not the pride it was meant to instill. I grew to understand the gifts of the earth, I couldn’t understand how ‘love of country’ could

omit recognition of the actual country itself. The only promise it requires is to a flag. What of the promises to each other and to the land? What would it be like to be raised on gratitude, to speak to the natural world as a member of the democracy of species, to raise a pledge of interdependence? In the Thanksgiving Address, I hear respect to all our nonhu-

man relatives, not one political entity, but to all life.”

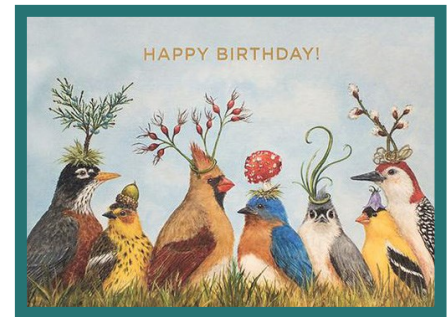

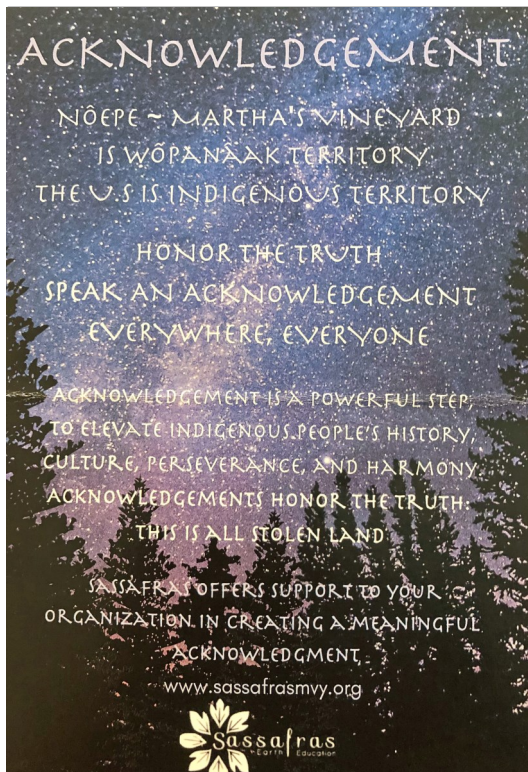
