Your Parish Committee met via

Zoom last month on December 8th. Here are some highlights.

- We voted unanimously in favor of the 2022 Leadership Slate as presented by Dorie Godfrey on behalf of the Nominating Leadership Development Committee. The slate will be presented to the congregation for a vote at our Annual Meeting on January 23, 2022. Many thanks to those who volunteered for these positions!
- Reverend Rob was pleased to share that both Candlelight services were fully reserved at capacity. Thank you to the Worship Committee and all those members who worked tirelessly in planning an extraordinary event!
- Please be sure and check out the Friday Email Archive now on the UUSMV.org website and

let Rita or Reverend Rob know if you have any other ideas for our website.

- With the recent departure of key volunteers (Celeste and Norm, we're looking at you!), we are hoping to streamline Caring, Membership and Hospitality so that people can volunteer for smaller jobs without having to attend regular meetings. Stay tuned for more information in the coming months.
- In discussing the Minister Search, we agreed that we likely will need to cast a wider net in terms of advertising outside of UUA channels and consider looking at candidates who might not have UU affiliation at this time.
- The Worship Committee continues to plan for a soft open in the chapel in March after the new audio-visual system is installed.
- Jan Casey gave her Treasurer's report indicating we continue to be in solid financial shape with a year-to-date excess of \$39,559 in income over

expenses. There will be some year-end bills that she expects to come in during December which will be offset by several outstanding 2021 pledges she anticipates being received by year end.

- 5 67 households pledged for 2022 totaling roughly \$83,500. This is a decrease from 2021. There is still time to make your 2022 pledge! Contact Jan Casey.
- The PC approved the 2022 budget as presented by Fin-Com which included \$5044 shortfall and \$29,750 of one-time expenses that will be paid out of the 2021 excess. Please plan to vote at our Annual Meeting on January 23, 2022.

White Privilege and Discrimination -The Other Side of the Coin

What is racial discrimination and what is its impact? That is what we wrote last month was important to know before "we can begin to work on correction." In her book, "Waking Up White", Debby Irving wrote that white privilege and discrimination "are flip sides of the same coin." Many whites seem to have a hard time

thinking that they have been privileged or even that blacks have been and are still being discriminated against. We think we have to find a way to make the situation clearer and help whites change their thinking.

Allen G. Johnson in his book, "Privilege, Power, and Difference" lists many examples of race privilege from a white point of view. One example is that, "Whites are less likely than blacks to be arrested". Because this example doesn't emphasize the discrimination, we want to turn his examples around to the flip side, the discrimination that blacks face (as well as other minorities).
